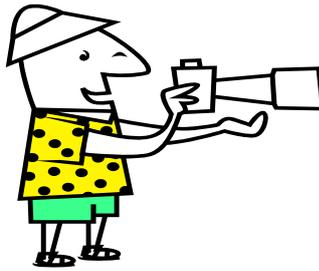

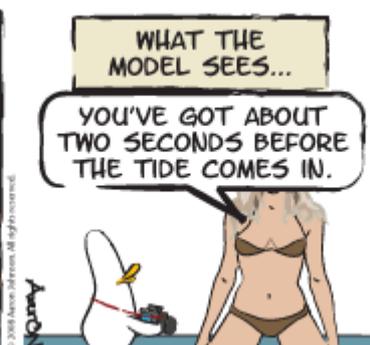
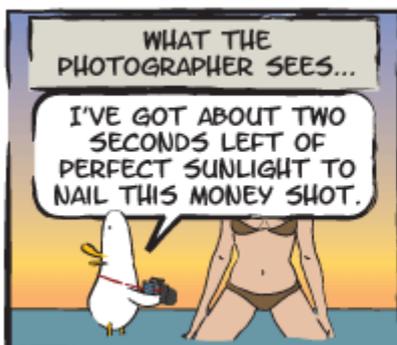
Well ... winter has arrived, hasn't it! As the rain and colder weather comes, you might start thinking about photos for July's meeting theme: water!

## Getting the colour right – part 1 - monitor calibration

Ever found yourself looking at your photo and thinking “the colour’s not right”? This can often happen when you compare a print with the image you see on your computer monitor. This month, we discuss the first step in getting this right – monitor calibration.

‘Calibrating your monitor’ means making sure the colours and tones of the image you see on your monitor are the ‘true’ colours and tones of the image.

For example, *if* your monitor’s brightness levels are higher than normal, your image will look brighter than it should normally look. You may then inappropriately darken it on the computer so that it looks ‘normal’. When you go to print this image, it may actually come out dark ... all because you falsely trusted what the monitor displayed.

So ensure the file you see on your monitor is what you’ll get out of your printer, the first step is to calibrate your monitor. There are two types of solutions: software calibration and hardware calibration. The former can be free but less accurate, whereas the hardware calibration costs (starting around \$100) but provides more accurate results.

Essentially, calibrating your monitor provides the computer with a set of instructions (called a *profile*) that tells it how to display colours and tones correctly.

For software options, there are two free products that do a reasonable job (there are more, but we’ll look at two in the article). If you have photoshop installed, you also have *adobe gamma* (which you can find via ‘Control Panel’ in Windows). Another tool is *Wizywig* which can be downloaded for free at <http://www.praxisoft.com>. Once installed, the programs are easy to use.

If obtaining accurate colours is very important to you, a hardware solution is recommended. This involves loading a small program onto your computer (which comes on a disk when you buy the calibration device). This program guides you through the steps to calibrate your monitor using a device that sits on your monitor to calculate the *profile* (see above) for that computer’s monitor.

Prices vary depending on the brand and also whether the hardware also calibrates prints and/or projected displays. Priced start just over \$100 (for the *Pantone Huey*). Other brands include the *Spyder 3 Express*, *ColorMunki*, and *Eye-One*. Do an internet search for these to compare features and prices.

Monitors (in their default mode) vary considerably in the way they display colour. In addition, over time, the colour display can ‘drift’ – requiring recalibration. If accurate colours are important to you, you need to trust what you see on the screen is correct – you need to ensure your monitor is calibrated. Next month – ensuring accurate colours when printing.

- **Mule café exhibiting**

Our club has been invited to exhibit some framed prints at Mule café (146 Sydney Rd, Brunswick). The club is keen to take up this offer. After some discussion, the committee decided the following process would be both fair and ensure a quality exhibition:

*Maximum of six photos per exhibition (roughly lasting a month). If you are interested, you will need to supply a digital file of your submission. The committee will then select six images (aiming for a theme that unites the collection if possible, as well as ensuring the quality of the file stands up to printing to an (approx) A4 size print). The club will arrange printing and framing (to ensure a consistent appearance) but the image maker will bear this cost (TBC, but estimated to be around \$30-40). If the maker wishes to sell the print, they may decide on the price and will keep 100% profits. If the print is not for sale, or not sold, the maker keeps the print at the end of the exhibition period. The café owner is happy to assist with sales inquiries but takes no responsibility for the images themselves.*
